



After working online throughout lockdown the Photography group started meeting again in person last summer. Since then we have had a busy year getting together regularly on the first Tuesday of the month at St Joseph's small hall.

Each month we give ourselves a theme and our photographs on the theme are viewed at the next meeting. The best of these are displayed on the D&D u3a website and some of them have been selected in the national 'u3a Eye' competition.

Group members have given presentations on photo harmony (combining photographs and music in short films), light painting, photographic composition, an international airshow, the wildlife of the Galapagos and Africa, the differences between JPEG and RAW digital file formats, photographing bluebells and insects on the North Downs, and using Lightroom software for cataloguing and sorting images.

Members have introduced us to the work of pioneering late Victorian photographer Frank Meadow Sutcliffe, the modern documentary photographer Martin Parr and the inspirational American artist Georgia O'Keeffe.

Led by two of our most experienced members we also undertook 'photo meets' at Southwater Country Park, Earlswood Lakes and Gatwick Aviation Museum in which we were tasked with finding images to illustrate a variety of subjects.

We have welcomed several newcomers to the group this year, and a survey was taken of all our members which revealed a wide variety of photographic interests which will be used to guide our sessions in the coming months.

Please bring your camera, a laptop or tablet and the necessary cables to connect them, when attending meetings. Proficient photographers are welcome as they can support others but beginners are especially welcome.

Pilates is a low-impact workout designed to strengthen the centre of the body, tone muscles, improve posture and increase flexibility.

Exercises are done sitting or lying on an aerobics mat. Each exercise is done slowly with precision and targets specific muscle groups.

Sessions start with a warm-up to mobilise the joints and muscles. Each exercise has specific movements and specific breathing, with few repetitions. Pilates differs from other forms of exercise in that it concentrates on the deep muscles essential for stability. It will improve your body awareness and, through specific breathing techniques, teach you how to maximise your abdominal control and strength.
